My Dear Friends in Christ,

While we are in the midst of hot summer days, this time of year does give us opportunities to pursue different activities which may deviate from our usual routine. Unfortunately our study and reflection on Holy Scripture may be one of them, especially as our usual Bible Study groups take a brief summer hiatus. So, it is even more valuable for us to regularly attend church on Sunday, to hear God's word proclaimed and reflect on how we can live those words within our various communities. To this end it may be helpful to be more prepared for receiving God's word on Sunday mornings by reflecting on those scripture passages before coming to church. During the month of August many of our Sunday Bible readings will be from The Letter to the Hebrews chapters 11-13. Let me provide some background understanding of this book as an aid to enhancing your Sunday worship experience.

In his book, *An introduction to the New Testament*, author Raymond Brown writes, "By all standards [Hebrews] is one of the most impressive works in the New Testament. Consciously rhetorical, carefully constructed, ably written in quality Greek, and passionately appreciative of Christ, Hebrews offers an exceptional number of unforgettable insights that have shaped subsequent Christianity." That opening sentence to Brown's chapter on Hebrews is a wonderfully concise description of the book. It is very difficult to properly classify what kind of genre Hebrews is. It has been described as a theological treatise, a sermon, a letter and as a combination of all three. The book was probably written sometime between 60-90 AD and its author is unknown. By the end of the second century its authorship had been attributed to the apostle Paul by some, although modern evidence stands strongly against that conclusion. Origen, considered the most learned figure of the third century, chose to leave anonymous the actual writer. He remarked that only God knew the author of Hebrews.

It is difficult to briefly summarize a complex book such as Hebrews. Throughout most of the book the author is making the point that Christ, as the final revelation of God, is both a fulfillment of the promises in the Hebrew scriptures and the means by which God provides a better way. Christ is better than the angelic sons of God (1:5-2:18). Christ is better than Moses and Joshua (3:1-4:13). Christ is better than the Aaronic priesthood (4:14-7:28). Through Christ a better covenant has been mediated than the one given previously through Moses (8:1-10:18).

Beginning at 10:19, the author develops his argument that faith is a better way than the system of Levitical sacrifice and offerings. The readings selected for the Sunday lectionary in August come from chapters 11-13. These three chapters contain some of the most beautiful interpretations and summaries of the great figures of faith of the Old Testament. Abel, Noah, Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, Joseph, Moses, Rahab, Gideon, Barak, Samson, Jephthah, David, Samuel "and the prophets" are given as ancient examples of faith. Despite their suffering, mocking, flogging, chains, imprisonment, stoning, death, wandering homeless, destitute, persecuted, tormented the "world was not worthy" of them. (11:38)

As these faithful figures of old obtained divine approval, so too must Christians endure. "Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight and the sin that clings so closely, and let us run with perseverance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus the pioneer and perfecter of our faith". (12:1-2a) We are reminded that we have not come to "something that can be touched" as one does when approaching a literal Mount Sinai, or a temple with physical sacrifices. These are only earthly examples that point to the heavenly realities. Through Christ and in Christ we have approached the heavenly Jerusalem where innumerable angels gather in festal assembly before Christ and God. Perceiving that scene is a compelling reason to accept the one who has mediated a new covenant through which we are promised a kingdom that cannot be shaken or removed. And understanding the reality of things we cannot see compels us to continue in mutual love and "not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for

by doing that some have entertained angels without knowing it" as what demonstrated time and again in the stories of the Hebrew scriptures. (13:1,2)

As we continue on in the season after Pentecost Sunday, the book of Hebrews provides us with an inspiring work that combines the logic of a theological treatise with the inspiration of a thoughtful sermon and the intimacy of a loving friend's letter. I encourage you to set aside time each day to read and reflect on the chapters of Hebrews, and if that is not possible, at least take the time to read chapters 11-13. You will be richly repaid for the effort.

Our Anglican Heritage

Sts. Aidan and Cuthbert of Lindisfarne

The Gospel first came to the northern English in 627, when King Edwin of Northumbria was converted by a mission from Canterbury led by Bishop Paulinus, who established his see at York. Edwin's death in battle in 632 was followed by a severe pagan reaction. A year later, Edwin's exiled nephew Oswald gained the kingdom, and proceeded at once to restore the Christian mission.

During his exile, Oswald had lived at Columba's monastery of Iona (see 9 June), where he had been converted and baptized. Hence he sent to Iona, rather than to Canterbury, for missionaries. The first monk to preach was a man named Cormac, who had no success, and returned to Iona to complain that the Northumbrians were a savage and unteachable race. A young monk named Aidan responded, "Perhaps you were too harsh with them, and they might have responded better to a gentler approach." At this, Aidan found himself appointed to lead a second expedition to Northumbria. He centered his work, not at York, but in imitation of his home monastery, on Lindisfarne, an island off the northeast coast of England, now often called Holy Isle. With his fellow monks and the English youths whom he trained, Aidan restored Christianity in Northumbria, King Oswald often serving as his interpreter, and extended the mission through the midlands as far south as London.

Aidan died at the royal town of Bamburgh, 31 August, 651. The historian Bede said of him: "He neither sought nor loved anything of this world, but delighted in distributing immediately to the poor whatever was given him by kings or rich men of the world. He traversed both town and country on foot, never on horseback, unless compelled by some urgent necessity. Wherever on his way he saw any, either rich or poor, he invited them, if pagans, to embrace the mystery of the faith; or if they were believers, he sought to strengthen them in their faith and stir them up by words and actions to alms and good works."

Orphaned early in life, Cuthbert was brought up by a widow who loved him like a son. According to St. Bede, he was a Briton. One night, while working as a shepherd, he had a marvellous vision of angels carrying the soul of St. Aidan to heaven. This occurrence seems to have impressed him deeply, though he went on to soldiering and possibly fought against the Mercians.

It was as a soldier that he knocked at the gate of Melrose Abbey. As a monk, he went on to become prior of the abbeys of Melrose and Lindisfarne. After some years at Lindisfarne, wishing to grow even closer to God, he retired as a hermit first to Holy Island, today named after him, and then to an even more remote location among the Farne Islands. Still, people persisted in following him even to this isolated place, and he graciously built a guest house near the landing stage of the isle to accommodate them.

Later, at the insistence of the Abbess St. Elfleda, a daughter of King Oswiu, he reluctantly accepted a bishopric and was consecrated Bishop of Lindisfarne. The two years of his episcopate were spent visiting his diocese preaching, teaching, distributing alms and working so many miraculous cures that during his lifetime he was known as the Wonderworker of Britain.

Weakened by his labors and austerities, Cuthbert sensed death approaching and again retired to his beloved retreat in the Farne Islands. He received the last sacraments and died peacefully, seated, his hands uplifted and his eyes raised heavenward.

The Venerable St. Bede also records in his life of the saint that when Cuthbert's sarcophagus was opened nine years after his death, his body was found to have been perfectly preserved or incorrupt.

Sts. Aidan and Cuthbert are remembered throughout the Episcopal Church every year on August 31.

Planned Giving Opportunities

Planned giving is a great opportunity for parishioners to help provide for the long term future of Caroline Church. Although there are immediate needs for the financial health of our parish that are addressed with yearly pledges, projecting decades into the future is equally important. Specific planned giving instruments can help provide income in perpetuity to meet our long term needs and dreams.

Although there are many types of Planned Gifts, any donation that takes into consideration tax consequences is a planned gift. Revocable bequests are bequests that can be changed by the donor at any time. Irrevocable bequests are gifts that become a legal commitment and cannot be changed or taken back. Charitable remainder trusts are when the donor receives income for his or her life, and the balance is remitted to the parish upon the donor's death or the death of a surviving heir. A LEAD trust is when our parish uses a portion of the return on investment for a specific number of years with the balance and any growth given back to the donor's heirs.

Gifts of appreciated securities are publicly traded stock that has increased in price since the donor originally purchased the stock. The stock is transferred directly to the parish and the donor is able to write off the market value on taxes, thus not paying capital gains taxes. Life insurance either an existing or new policy in which Caroline Church is named as a beneficiary.

Gifts of property could be both real and other, including art, jewelry, antiques, and real estate. In all situations donors need to consult their own legal and tax advisors before making a planned gift to maximize tax benefits. If you think you can make a planned gift to Caroline Church, contact our Investment chair Dan Rowe or vestryman Chuck Glaser to discuss this further.

Volunteer Sunday School Director



NEW PROPOSED COLUMBARIUM FOR GRAVE- YARD

Over a year or more ago the Vestry reviewed several plans for the construction of a Columbarium area within the cremains area of the graveyard. Recently they reviewed yet another plan somewhat like shown in the picture below. The plan for a Columbarium is becoming a need as "traditional" burial space is becoming more and more limited. Statistics show many more families and individuals are opting for cremation as a means of burial. In response to this growing trend and the general acceptance of cremation, a columbarium serves as a sacred space in which to lay the remains of the faithfully departed to rest.

A columbarium consists of a series of niches, which can hold up to two urns. The remains are sealed within the niche, the outside of which is covered by a granite face. Each niche face has the information (i.e. name, date of birth and death of the deceased.) The function of a Columbarium is to provide an above-grade structure designed for the interment of the cremated remains of the deceased. The Canterbury Columbarium featured above holds 80 niches or 160 urn spaces. Each niche may hold two standard sized urns. This means each niche can be provided to a husband and a wife or a single person.

The Canterbury Columbarium is Circular Shape - 5'0" High x 6'7" Diameter. The unit is a pre-cast concrete structure with footings. It is faced with granite, similar in material to other structures in the cemetery. Once the structure is in place within the center of our present cremains area, paving to compliment the graveyard as well as the structure itself would be completed. The plan also includes four benches within the area which would be offset by plantings to delineate the cremains section of the graveyard. The in-ground cremains would not be disturbed and room for additional in-ground internments would continue to be available.

We believe the beauty of our historic cemetery would be enhanced by the addition of a well planned Columbarium, as well as providing an option for those giving thought to their final resting place. As Vestry continues to prayerfully consider this addition to our graveyard, parishioners with interest or questions would be appreciated. Please speak with Cn. Richard, Ginny Apmann, Don Muffly, or any of our Vestry members.






