My Dear Friends in Christ,

Can you believe how quickly the summer is passing? Some of you may still be planning some final summer trips and waiting for people to visit. Vacations have taken up a portion of our summer, but as in any family there is work to be done at all times. Perhaps some of you are planning to do some outside jobs that have been waiting since last summer. Whatever we have planned, it is an opportunity to be active in different ways.

A friend, who was planning a trip to Scotland and Wales, suggested that I read a book by Martin and Nigel Palmer, *The Spiritual Traveler: England, Scotland, Wales*. Actually I had it on my shelf in preparation for an extended visit to Europe to visit Cassandra that did not materialize. I decided to give it a relook last month. If you are planning a trip to that part of Europe, I would recommend it. It takes you on a journey across rural and urban landscapes of Britain and helps one discover and explore a multitude of sacred sites: ancient stone circles and tombs, Christian and pre-Christian shrines, medieval synagogues, small country churches and soaring cathedrals, Eastern temples, abbey ruins, sacred cities, holy wells and rivers, ancient yew trees and monastery gardens. *The Spiritual Traveler* reveals the stories behind these extraordinary places of spiritual power and offers thirteen pilgrim routes by car, bike, or foot.

Wherever we find ourselves, Summer is a special time for us because we see God's creative hand at work in marvelous ways. We see the beauty of His creation, and we have longer days in which to observe it. In the midst of enjoying God's creation, we must not forget Him who created all.

It is interesting that the word "recreation" is referred to so often in summer time. Looking at that word, re-creation, we can gain some insight into what is before us. Certainly we cannot "re-create" – only God creates, so what does it mean? I believe that it is an experience that happens to us. After something, we are "re-created". Since, God only can create, then, I believe, it follows that only God can re-create.

Fortunately we are not Puritans. As Anglicans we often stress the doctrine of the Incarnation. This means that we look for God in His creation. Hopefully, we look to God in our own recreation, as we are conformed more and more to His likeness.

Summer, then, should be a time for us to take stock of what God has placed all around us and look at all of this beauty through "incarnational colored glasses." Perhaps a popular hymn says it best, "Morning has broken like the first morning ... Praise every morning, God's recreation of the new day."

## Our Anglican Heritage

William Porcher DuBose

Episcopal theologian William P. DuBose was born at Winnsboro, South Carolina, the son of Theodore Marion DuBose and Jane Porcher, both of Huguenot descent. In 1851 he entered the South Carolina Military College, the Citadel, from which he graduated with first honors in 1855. The next year DuBose entered the University of Virginia and received his M.A. degree in 1859. He then studied at the Theological Seminary of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of South Carolina, Camden, which had opened in 1859. While he was a student at the seminary, the Civil War began, and DuBose was appointed adjutant of the Holcombe Legion. During the war he was wounded twice, captured once, and imprisoned but later released in a prisoner exchange. During a furlough in 1863 DuBose married Anne Barnwell Peronneau of Charleston; the couple had four children. In December 1863 he was ordained deacon at Grace Church, Camden. He joined Kershaw's brigade at Greeneville, Tennessee, and began his ministry there. After the war, he became rector of St. John's Parish, Fairfield, composed of St. John's, Winnsboro, and St. Stephen's, Ridgeway. He was ordained priest on September 9, 1866. In January 1868 he became the rector of Trinity Church, Abbeville, South Carolina.

During the 1870 convention of the Diocese of South Carolina, DuBose received serious consideration for election to the office of bishop. He considered his failure to be elevated to this office a "fortunate escape." The following year he was elected the first chaplain of the University of the South, Sewanee, Tennessee, a new Episcopal university which had opened on September 18, 1868. From 1871 until his death, DuBose's life and the history of the university were interwoven.

DuBose helped establish the School of Theology, which opened as a distinct department in 1878 and served as chaplain of university until 1883. From 1893 to 1894 he was acting dean and from 1894 to 1908 the second dean of the School of Theology. He taught almost every subject in the curriculum, although he was primarily professor of New Testament.

DuBose was arguably the major Episcopal theologian in the United States. He published *The Soteriology of the New Testament* (1892), *The Ecumenical Councils* (1896), *The Gospel in the Gospels* (1906), *The Reason of Life* (1911), and *Turning Points in My Life* (1912). DuBose is known as "Sewanee's Doctor," and he is commemorated in the Liturgical Calendar of the Episcopal Church on August 18. He has been called the most important creative theologian the Episcopal Church has produced.

In April 1873 Anne Peronneau DuBose died. In December 1878 DuBose married Maria Louise Yerger, who opened a school in Monteagle called Fairmont College. DuBose died in 1918. He is remembered throughout the Episcopal Church every August 18.

## Message from the Presiding Bishop

TEC Presiding Bishop Michael Curry a couple of weeks ago spoke about ministry with young people. Presiding Bishop Curry concentrated on the church's ministry to and with young people in his sermon at African Episcopal Church of St. Thomas in Philadelphia during a Eucharist commemorating the 225th anniversary of the black presence in the Episcopal Church.

Absalom Jones, the church's first black priest, founded St. Thomas in 1792. It was the first black Episcopal church. The conference honored both Absalom Jones and Jehu Jones Jr., a Lutheran minister who founded one of the first African-American Lutheran congregations in the 1830s, also in Philadelphia. Evangelical Lutheran Church in America Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton presided at the three-hour Eucharist.

Curry reminded the congregation of the Hebrew midwives who organized to defy pharaoh's order that all Hebrew baby boys were to be killed at birth because he feared the Hebrews' power. One of the babies they saved was Moses, who grew up to lead his people to freedom.

Then, in Jesus' time, Herod followed "the pattern that we see of tyrants throughout history and to this very day" who seek to destroy some of society's children. Today, Curry said, those tyrants would take away their public education opportunities and their health care. "Destroy the children and you destroy a nation," he said. "Our children, whether they are black white, red, yellow – no matter who they are – are being left on the garbage heap of America," Curry said. "If you want to make America great, Mr. Trump? Save the children," he said, pacing St. Thomas' aisle.

The congregation jumped to its feet, roaring approval. "The child you save today may save you tomorrow," was Curry's refrain. He urged Episcopalians and Lutherans to adopt schools in their neighborhoods, do more for children in the summer, open their buildings to children at times other than Sunday mornings and develop programs for children. "We need a Sunday school movement that doesn't just meet on Sunday," he said. "We need churches filled with children and I don't care how much noise they make."

This generation of children needs to hear the real story of Jesus, not what Curry said was the "fake news" about Jesus. "There's a lot of fake faith out there that masquerades as Christianity and looks like Christianity but it doesn't have a thing to do with Jesus," he said, criticizing preachers of the prosperity gospel.

When the message is about wealth and not about service and Jesus, it is a "perversion of the gospel and I don't

care how mega the church is, how big it is, that is wrong. It is false, it is fake and our children are falling prey to it," he said.

Curry warned that prosperity gospel preaching ranges all over Africa and Central and South America, and is spreading elsewhere. "And it is making some people rich by preying on the poor and that is not the gospel," he said. He warned against forms of Christianity in the United States that put down immigrants, poor people and "cozy up to power." "And, if you listen, they never talk about Jesus," he said.

The West, Curry proclaimed, needs to be re-evangelized by a Jesus Movement that preaches and lives a Christianity that looks and sounds like Jesus. He warned that such a movement is not always an easy one to follow. "If you love God, you have to love who and what God loves," he said, no matter their religious, ethnic, political or ideological affiliations. "It doesn't mean you have to let them get away with everything, but you have got to love them," he said.

"My brothers and sisters, we've got work to do. Don't leave this place just feeling good. Don't leave this place just shouting," he said. "You've got to leave this place ready to change this world."

## **Planned Giving Opportunities**

Planned giving is a great opportunity for parishioners to help provide for the long term future of Caroline Church. Although there are immediate needs for the financial health of our parish that are addressed with yearly pledges and special appeals, projecting decades into the future is equally important. Specific planned giving instruments can help provide income in perpetuity to meet our long term needs and dreams.

Although there are many types of Planned Gifts, any donation that takes into consideration tax consequences is a planned gift. Revocable bequests are bequests that can be changed by the donor at any time. Irrevocable bequests are gifts that become a legal commitment and cannot be changed or taken back. Charitable remainder trusts are when the donor receives income for his or her life, and the balance is remitted to the parish upon the donor's death or the death of a surviving heir. A LEAD trust is when our parish uses a portion of the return on investment for a specific number of years with the balance and any growth given back to the donor's heirs.

Gifts of appreciated securities are publicly traded stock that has increased in price since the donor originally purchased the stock. The stock is transferred directly to the parish and the donor is able to write off the market value on taxes, thus not paying capital gains taxes. Also, life insurance either an existing or new policy in which Caroline Church is named as a beneficiary is a planned gift.

Gifts of property could be both real and other, including art, jewelry, antiques, and real estate. In all situations donors need to consult their own legal and tax advisors before making a planned gift to maximize tax benefits. If you think you can make a planned gift to Caroline Church, contact our Investment chair Dan Rowe or the parish office. More information about Planned Giving to Caroline Church will be coming out on a regular basis.

## Buildings and Grounds Update

There is good news to report on the Carriage Shed project. The Robert David Lion Gardiner Foundation ([www.rdlgfoundation.org](http://www.rdlgfoundation.org)) has awarded the Caroline Church a matching grant of \$23,700 to stabilize the shed. The temporary bracing is already in place. The next step will be to crib and beam the structure, and “hang” it from the crib and beams. Scott C. Brown of Antique Carpenters will be doing the work, so feel free to watch as the progress continues. 

Remember, this building was originally a 19<sup>th</sup> century home. All of the roof materials will be coming off this time, and replaced with new roofing material. 
