Winter solstice is the shortest day and the longest night of the year. Traditionally, it is a time of both foreboding and expectancy, as the longest night leads to the revival of the sun. And yet it is a turning point, when the sun reaches its southernmost point from the equator and seems to pause before reversing course. "Solstice" in Latin means "the sun standing still." In ancient times, observers watched the sun sink lower in the sky each day, and feared it would disappear completely and leave them in darkness.

People practiced special rituals intended to entice the sun's return. Bonfires and candles, with their imitative magic, helped fortify the waning sun and ward off the spirits of darkness. These symbols live on in our modern seasonal customs: the candles of Hanukkah and Christmas are kin to the fiery rites of old, which celebrated the miracle of the earth's renewal.

These traditions reflect our need to come together in times of extended darkness. We celebrate not only the re-birth of the sun, but the community of life on earth.

Music, dance and renewal of spirit at the great turning point of the year

Winter Solstice is our contemporary take on ancient solstice rituals, when people came together during the longest night of the year to celebrate the turning point in the Earth's journey around the sun, and the birth of a new year. Now in its 34th year, this cross-cultural performance within the awe-inspiring space of the Cathedral of St. John the Divine has become one of New York's favorite holiday events.

This year's Solstice promises to be a landmark in our tradition of interweaving diverse performers of the world. Joining the Paul Winter Consort will be dynamic vocalist Theresa Thomason; the 25 dancers and drummers of the Forces of Nature Dance Theatre; and guest musicians to be announced.

For me this solstice celebration is an ever-renewing thrill – whether watching the sun gong ascend 12 stories with its player to the vault of the Cathedral; or hearing the "tree of sounds" as it slowly turns, reflecting a myriad of lights from its hundreds of bells, gongs and chimes. Dear Caroline Church Family,

My name is Brian Hazell, you see me around church or up at the altar helping Father Richard or Father Farrell as an acolyte, but now I am asking for your help.

On January 8th 2014, I will be holding a community blood drive in the Marco C. Smith Building. In the next several weeks I will be asking for pledges from people who are willing to donate blood to help save lives.

I know that after the Holidays most people feel worn out by all the giving that they have done but I don't ask for money, food or presents, I just ask for time, if you show up we will take care of the rest. There is no substitute for human blood; there is no way to make blood - it must be donated by good people like you. One pint of blood is all that you donate but that one pint can save three lives. Only about 2% of all the local eligible donors donate which is lower than the national average of 5% which leaves it especially hard for our local hospitals to supply everyone who needs blood, especially during the holidays because of everyone's busy schedules.

If anyone wants more information about the drive and what makes a candidate eligible please come and talk to me at church or call me at (631)-751-2623. You do not need to be a member of our church to donate; this is a community blood drive so bring friends and family.

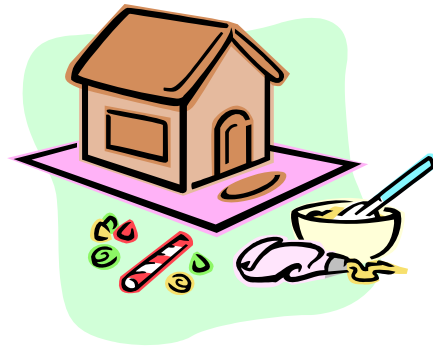

The Minutes of the 147th Annual Convention of the Diocese of Long Island

Midday Prayer and Renewal of Baptismal Vows

In his opening remarks Bishop Provenzano stressed the opportunities that our diversity affords us. We are on a mission of reconciliation in our broken world and communities. One Diocese; One Mission Presiding Bishop Katherine continued (in a live webcast) the message of deconstructing the walls that divide us; seeing all humanity as our friend and being continuously vigilant in our actions A racial justice film talked to the issue that justice and redemption are economic issues and that hope is in the new generation.

Safe Surrender Project.

The practice of stop and frisk based on racial profiling is wrong and through the Safe Surrender Project persons with minor infractions can have their infractions addressed in a less intimidating environment. Through this program the church can mission to the community.

Rise Mentoring Project

At St. Albans & St. Augustine the mentoring project seeks to break the school to prison pipeline which so many minorities find themselves caught in because of student suspensions. The program provides 11-14 year olds with workshops, seminar and a strong mentoring presence.

The Convention broke into talking sessions to discuss the following questions:

When were you first aware of racism?

Where do you see racism?

How can the church concretely take part in reconciliation?

Ideas and thoughts were shared at the microphones.

There will be a racism summit on January 20, 2014 and awareness training in December.

3:30 PM call to order

Fr. David Sibley was nominated and approved as Assistant Secretary to the Convention.

Several procedural issues were discussed such as seating, badge requirements, the voting smart card, the location of the Chapel, revising the agenda, and dispensing with the reading of last year's minutes.

Changes in the lectionary, as seen on pages 26 & 27 of the convention booklet, were approved by motion.

Nominations for various positions as presented in the Election Ballot Listing and Tally Sheet were read and open nominations were taken.

Nominees were so moved.

Voting and elections to Diocesan Boards and Bodies was conducted by electronic ballot.

Live tweets were displayed on convention big screens throughout the sessions

Bishop's Address

The Bishop thanked his staff and particularly Fr. David Sibley for initiating the successful electronic voting.

Recognition was given to the feast Day of St. Margaret of Scotland in conjunction with the theme of the address which emphasized being servants to the people of God by living the Gospel in a practical way. The Diocese is living and vital; we consist of the four largest and most diverse counties in America. The Bishop reminded us that we must take down the rear view mirrors and be the Church in new ways, with no outcasts. We must endeavor to invite and accept; that the Baptismal font expresses inclusion.

The Bishop raised objection in principal to the New York State approval of gambling and urged churches to not use casinos nights, card games or raffles to raise funds. In addition, he encouraged the development of 12 Step Programs to aid those addicted to gambling.

The fostering of ecumenical partnerships with those of other diverse faiths was encouraged as a way to overcome estrangement.

The Bishop's vision is to see, in all things and places, people serving God's mission by being servants to all; we must provide care for the sick, the brokenhearted and the lost.

The Bishop issued a call for an Assistant Bishop to be appointed by him and approved by the Standing Committee.

11:10 AM – Call to order

Report on the Bishop's Address.

Call for a vote on a Resolution to appoint an Assistant Bishop.

Many objections and questions were raised such as: why not elect a Suffragan Bishop; what is the difference between a Suffragan bishop and an assistant bishop; what necessitated the need to appoint someone to that position; will the appointment reflect the diversity of the Diocese?

Questions /answers and discussion ensued with a limit of 3 minutes per statement.

The motion to appoint an Assistant Bishop passed.
A motion was made and seconded to amend the schedule to allow for the discussion of the ministry plan as the next item on the agenda.

Ministry Plan

The 2012 audit was completed and approved by the auditors Price Waterhouse.

As of Oct., 2013 there was a \$50,000 surplus and the 2013 budget should be balanced

Based on projections a 5% increase in revenue will be required in 2014.

Video produced by the Diocese was shown highlighting the enormous response and programs generated in response to the storm. *Jubilee Centers* created in response to Sandy are still operating with the assistance of Episcopal Charities in Mastic.

Report on the Committee on Canon

Fr. Madden (who was attending his 51st Convention)

Proposition I-Second Reading-Passed

Proposition to amend the Constitution of the Diocese clarifies language that apportions delegates to the Diocesan Convention.

“Between three hundred one (301) and five hundred (500) there shall be a second Lay Delegate”

“Over five hundred one (501) communicants in good standing, there shall be a third Lay Delegate”

Proposition passed and will be read for the third time at the 2014 Convention. Proposition must be read at three consecutive Conventions to change the Constitutional.

Proposition II-Passed

Regarding candidates for election

Nominations will be printed in random order not alphabetical; nominations from the floor of the Convention will be added to the ballot as received; each nominee shall submit a statement of not more than 75 words outlining qualifications in advance to the Secretary of Convention or have printed copies for all Delegates.

Proposition III-Passed

Treasurer of the Convention

Will serve *ex-officio* on the Board of Trustees.

Proposition IV-Passed

Safe Church Training

For clergy, seminarians, postulants, candidates for holy orders, volunteers who regularly supervise youth activities, Vestry Members, key holders to any church property, the leaders of any group with regular access to church property or facilities shall participate in a minimum of three hours of initial training, on issues of child sexual abuse in Church settings, sexual harassment in employment, mentor and colleague relationships, and sexual exploitation in pastoral relationships. The content of the training varies depending upon the category of the persons described in Section I and Section II of this Proposition. Training will be made available in on-line modules.

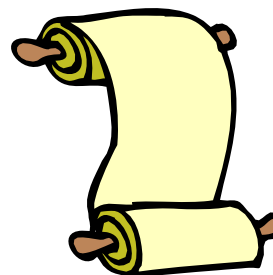
Through our stories, we are brought into a deeper relationship with each other. Only through this exchange of stories will we know and be known; and fulfill what it means to be a community of welcome.

Help Restore Temple Isaiah's Historic Torah Scroll

Our neighboring congregation, Temple Isaiah on Stony Brook Rd., is engaged this fall and winter in a Torah Restoration Project. Because the Torah is the basis of our common heritage and monotheistic belief system, Rabbi Stephen Karol has invited us and other interfaith neighbors to take part.

Shortly after ground-breaking in 1967, Temple Isaiah was entrusted with the care of the 173 year-old Czech Torah Memorial Scroll # 1511, one of 1563 Torah scrolls brought to Prague and saved during the Holocaust. Temple Isaiah's Torah came from a village called Nemecky Brod (now Havlickuv Brod). In June 1942, 129 Jews from that area were transported to extermination camps. We gather in special community to remember those who perished as we help to restore and renew the sheep parchment scroll they and their ancestors used.

The Sofer (scribe/calligrapher) will facilitate sessions on two Sundays, January 26th and March 9th at 10 a.m., 11:15 a.m., 1 p.m., 2:15 p.m., 4 p.m., and 5 p.m. each day. The teaching aspect lasts about 30 minutes and then the writing for everyone takes about the same amount of time.

Each person gets to hold the pen with the Sofer and adorn a letter, and is then encouraged to write down his/her reaction to this experience in a journal. A donation is requested, \$36 minimum.

Do You Hear God when He speaks to you?

A young man had been to Wednesday Night Bible Study. The Pastor had shared about listening to God and obeying the Lord's voice. The young man couldn't help but wonder, 'Does God still speak to people?' After service, he went out with some friends for coffee and pie and they discussed the message. Several different ones talked about how God had led them in different ways.

It was about ten o'clock when the young man started driving home. Sitting in his car, he just began to pray, 'God...If you still speak to people, speak to me. I will listen. I will do my best to obey.'

As he drove down the main street of his town, he had the strangest thought to stop and buy a gallon of milk. He shook his head and said out loud, 'God is that you?' He didn't get a reply and started on toward home. But again, the thought, buy a gallon of milk. The young man thought about Samuel and how he didn't recognize the voice of God, and how little Samuel ran to Eli.

'Okay, God, in case that is you, I will buy the milk.' It didn't seem like too hard a test of obedience. He could always use the milk. He stopped and purchased the gallon of milk and started off toward home.

As he passed Seventh Street, he again felt the urge, 'Turn Down that street.' This is crazy he thought, and drove on past the intersection. Again, he felt that he should turn down Seventh Street. At the next intersection, he turned back and headed down Seventh. Half jokingly, he said out loud, 'Okay, God, I will.'

He drove several blocks, when suddenly, he felt like he should stop. He pulled over to the curb and looked around. He was in a semi-commercial area of town. It wasn't the best but it wasn't the worst of neighborhoods either. The businesses were closed and most of the houses looked dark like the people were already in bed.

Again, he sensed something, 'Go and give the milk to the people in the house across the street.' The young man looked at the house. It was dark and it looked like the people were either gone or they were already asleep. He started to open the door and then sat back in the car seat.

'Lord, this is insane. Those people are asleep and if I wake them up, they are going to be mad and I will look stupid.' Again, he felt like he should go and give the milk.

Finally, he opened the door, 'Okay God, if this is you, I will go to the door and I will give them the milk. If you want me to look like a crazy person, okay. I want to be obedient. I guess that will count for something, but if they don't answer right away, I am out of here.'

He walked across the street and rang the bell. He could hear some noise inside. A man's voice yelled out, 'Who is it? What do you want?' Then the door opened before the young man could get away.

The man was standing there in his jeans and T-shirt. He looked like he just got out of bed. He had a strange look on his face and he didn't seem too happy to have some stranger standing on his doorstep. 'What is it?'

The young man thrust out the gallon of milk, 'Here, I brought this to you.' The man took the milk and rushed down a hallway. Then from down the hall came a woman carrying the milk toward the kitchen. The man was following her holding a baby. The baby was crying. The man had tears streaming down his face.

The man began speaking and half crying, 'We were just praying. We had some big bills this month and we ran out of money. We didn't have any milk for our baby. I was just praying and asking God to show me how to get some milk.'

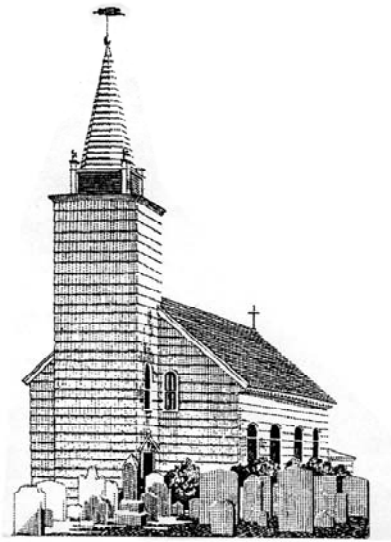
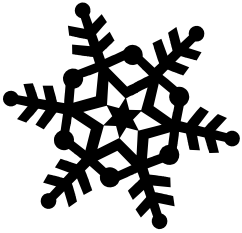
His wife in the kitchen yelled out, 'I asked him to send an Angel with some. Are you an Angel?'
