My Dear Friends in Christ,

The best blessing that I have as Rector of Caroline Church is to be the pastor of so many talented and gifted parishioners. Last month in The Village Times Herald, not one, or two, or even three, but four parishioners were honored as Men and Women of the Year. Now I know that each of these individuals would not want a spot light put on them, so I hope, in the spirit of the upcoming Lenten season, they will forgive me.

Jean Darrow was named Woman of the Year in the Environment. Jean is a wildlife rehabilitator extraordinaire. If there is an injured animal of whatever species - deer, birds, foxes chickens cats, guinea pigs - needing attention, Jean has the knowledge and more importantly the heart to nurse them back to health. She has done this virtually all her life, using her own resources. Her love for "all creatures great and small" is a testimony to our calling to care for all Our Lord has given to us. St. Francis would no doubt be smiling down on someone like Jean who has the deepest respect and love for the animal world.

Dr. Lawrence Hurst, is one of the most well known and highly respected hand surgeons in the country. Together with his colleague, Dr. Marie Badalamente, they are People of the Year in Science. Their work in providing a non-surgical treatment for Dupuytren's contracture has provided relief for many individuals with constriction of motion in the hands and other limbs. Dr. Hurst has been a professor and chairman of orthopedics at Stony Brook University School of Medicine for many years and one who realizes that God gives us not only our intelligence and insights to help solve medical issues but other noteworthy colleagues who we collaborate with to help the human condition.

Flo Kemp is this year's Woman of the Year in the Arts. An artist is expected to have talent, consistency, and an appreciation of the world around her, and certainly Flo has that in abundance, but a truly gifted artist I think is one who is able help others develop their full potential and this Flo has done for decades. She has established classes and formed art Clubs and Shows within our community and beyond for artists to hone their work. So when you see one of Flo's exquisite oil paintings or etchings displayed in various galleries, remember that this

dedicated woman of the arts has quietly helped launch and nurture the giftedness of many women and men as they create something that adds to the beauty of the world God has placed us in.

Out of all the talented women in the Three Village Community and beyond, one person rose above all the rest this past year, Barbara Russell. She is The Three Village Times Herald's Woman of the Year. At Caroline Church we have appreciated her dedication to the beauty of our sanctuary, being our Altar Guild Director for many years. We have also been the beneficiary of her extensive knowledge of our parish history as she co-chairs our parish's Historical and Cultural Artifacts Commission. The blessing she has been to us has paled in comparison to the unique preservationist she has been for our community as the Brookhaven Town Historian. Barbara fully realizes that behind the many records and photographs preserved, houses and parks landmarked, and research accomplished, are the people who created that history. Helping to preserve their contributions to our society enriches our present and strengthens our future.

Each of us at Caroline Church can take a healthy pride in acknowledging these talented and truly selfless followers of Christ. For they have shown us that what God has gifted us with is to always be used for His glory and honor.

## Our Anglican Heritage

### Brigid of Kildare

Daughter of Dubtach, pagan Scottish king of Leinster, and Brocca, a Christian Pictish slave who had been baptized by Saint Patrick. Just before Brigid's birth, her mother was sold to a Druid landowner. Brigid remained with her mother until she was old enough to serve her legal owner Dubtach, her father. She grew up marked by her high spirits and tender heart, and as a child, she heard Saint Patrick preach, which she never forgot. She could not bear to see anyone hungry or cold, and to help them, often gave away things that were Dubtach's. When Dubtach protested, she replied that "*Christ dwelt in every creature*". Dubtach tried to sell her to the King of Leinster, and while they bargained, she gave a treasured sword of her father's to a leper. Dubtach was about to strike her when Brigid explained she had given the sword to God through the leper, because of its great value. The King, a Christian, forbade Dubtach to strike her, saying "Her merit before God is greater than ours". Dubtach solved this domestic problem by giving Brigid her freedom.

Brigid's aged mother was in charge of her master's dairy. Brigid took charge, and often gave away the produce. But the dairy prospered under her (hence her patronage of milk maids, dairy workers, cattle, etc.), and the Druid freed Brigid's mother.

Brigid returned to her father, who arranged a marriage for her with a young bard. She refused, and to keep her virginity, went to her Bishop, Saint Mel of Ardagh, and took her first vows. Legend says that she prayed that her beauty be taken from her so no one would seek her hand in marriage; her prayer was granted, and she regained her beauty only after making her vows. Another tale says that when Saint Patrick heard her final vows, he mistakenly used the form for ordaining priests. When told of it he replied, "*So be it, my son, she is destined for great things.*"

Her first convent started c.468 with seven nuns. At the invitation of bishops, she started convents all over Ireland. She was a great traveler, especially considering the conditions of the time, which led to her patronage of travelers, sailors, etc. Brigid invented the double monastery, the monastery of Kildara, which means *Church of the Oak*, that she ran on the Liffey River being for both monks and nuns. Saint Conleth became its first bishop; this connection and the installation of a bell that lasted over 1000 years apparently led to her patronage of blacksmiths and those in related fields.

What emerges from many of these stories and legends

about Brigid is the portrait of a strong and gentle woman, a powerful leader, a good organizer, a skilful healer and a wise spiritual guide. Brigid has become – for men and women – a potent symbol of Christian womanhood and the feminine face of God.

Brigid died at Kildare on 1 February, 525 AD. She was laid to rest in a jeweled casket at Kil Dara. In 835, her remains were moved from Kildare to protect them from Norse invaders. She was interred in the same grave that holds the remains of St Patrick and St Columcille at the Cathedral grounds in Downpatrick. There are different spellings to her name – Brigit, Bridget, Bríd, Bride. She is also known as "Mary of the Gael." (Mary of the Irish). Brigid's feast day throughout the Episcopal and Anglican Communion is on the first day of February.



### Ash Wednesday February 13

Our Lenten Journey begins on Ash Wednesday, February 13. The use of ashes as a sign of penitence goes back to the Old Testament times and still has special significance for us as we reflect on our lives past and our hope for the days to come. We have all, as the Prayer Book says, "erred and strayed from Thy ways like lost sheep... we have left undone those things we ought to have done, and done those things we ought NOT to have done."

Ash Wednesday provides us the occasion to seek to put things right, and to see our lives in the light of God's eyes, to affirm God's loving kindness, and to open our lives to God's healing presence.

So that we, each one of us, may have an opportunity to gather together as a community in "love and faith and true repentance," our parish will offer three Ash Wednesday services throughout the day. Do plan to attend of one these special Ash Wednesday services of Holy Communion with Imposition of Ashes: 10:00 a.m., 5:00 p.m. and 8:00 p.m.

May this Ash Wednesday prove the beginning of a rich and rewarding spiritual journey, one that will deepen our faith by opening our lives more fully to God's forgiving and healing presence.

# Lent Madness 2013

## *The Sainly Smack Down*

What do you get when you combine a love of sports with holy saints? Lent Madness, of course. Based loosely on the wildly popular NCAA basketball tournament, Lent Madness pits 32 saints against one another in a single-elimination bracket as they compete for the coveted Golden Halo. But it is more than that: Lent Madness is really an online devotional tool designed to help people learn about saints.

Lent Madness began in 2010 as the brainchild of the Rev. Tim Schenck, an Episcopal priest and rector of St. John's Church in Hingham, Massachusetts. In seeking a fun, engaging way for people to learn about the men and women comprising the church's calendar of saints, Schenck came up with this unique Lenten devotion. Combining his love of sports with his passion for the lives of the saints, Lent Madness was born on his blog "Clergy Family Confidential."

Starting last year, Schenck partnered with the Rev. Scott Gun, Executive Director of Forward Movement (the same folks that publish Forward Day by Day) and Lent Madness went viral, reaching over 50,000 people and getting mentioned in everything from the Washington Post to Sports Illustrated (seriously).

Here's how it works: on the weekdays of Lent information is posted about two different saints on [www.lentmadness.org](http://www.lentmadness.org) and then participants vote to determine who goes on to the next round. Each pairing remains open for a set period of time – usually 24 hours – and people vote for their favorite saint. 16 saints make it to the Round of the Sainly Sixteen; eight advance to the Round of the Elate Eight; four make it to the Faithful Four; two to the Championship; and the winner is awarded the Golden Halo. The first round consists of basic biographical information about each of the 32 saints. Things get a bit more interesting in the subsequent rounds as we offer quotes and quirks, explore legends, and even move into the area of saintly kitsch. It's fun, it's informative, it's the saintly smack down!

To win in 2013, will take grit, determination, holiness, and perhaps some good old-fashioned luck. This year Lent Madness features a slate of saints ancient and modern, Biblical and ecclesiastical including John the Baptist, Martin Luther King, Hilda of Whitby, Luke, Dorothy Day, Benedict of Nursia, Martin Luther, and Harriet Tubman as they vie to fill the shoes of 2012 winner Mary Magdalene.

This all kicks off on "Ash Thursday," February 14, and will continue throughout the 40-day season of Lent. To participate, log onto [www.lentmadness.org](http://www.lentmadness.org), where you can also print out a bracket and fill it out to see how you fare or "compete" against friends and family members. Like that other March tournament, there will be drama and intrigue, upsets and thrashings, last-minute victories and Cinderellas.

If you're looking for a Lenten discipline that is fun, educational, occasionally goofy, and always joyful, join the Lent Madness journey. Lent needn't be all doom and gloom. After all, what could be more joyful than a season specifically set aside to grow closer to God? Check out the web site: [www.lentmadness.org](http://www.lentmadness.org).




# SHROVE TUESDAY PANCAKE BREAKFAST

Originally beginning on Sunday, Shrove Tuesday was a three-day celebration that culminated in large feasts on Tuesday night. By the beginning of the 20th century, however, the event was restricted to the Tuesday observance. *Carnival* became associated with Shrove Tuesday, in part from the Spring Equinox celebrations that were practiced by the Romans and the ancient tribes of Europe. The word "carnival" comes from the Latin *car-nem levare*, meaning "to take away the flesh". However, in the New Orleans and Rio de Janeiro celebrations, public revelry and carousing have become the tradition for Carnival around the world. It was mostly as a result of the Carnival celebrations that the Church restricted the observance to a single day.

## Buildings and Grounds

While things slowed—a bit—in January on the buildings & grounds front, it has not stopped. Inside, some storage shelf work was done in a closet on the main floor of the Marco C. Smith Building and the Parish House basement had some work done (remove bulletin and repaint the wall) to prepare the room for displays created by our Historical Committee. Outside we are seeing work on the fence repair as the contractor removed that curved section for repair or replacement. Hopefully the fence work will be completed shortly. Finally, our tree service was on site the week of January 21. They removed several trees fatally damaged by Sandy, removed hanging limbs from even more trees that were salvageable, and cabled two trees (one ornamental and one large maple) that we hope can be saved.

Also in January we had to deal with some roof leakage in one room of the Rectory. A temporary repair has been made, but the roof over that small sunroom—a relatively small area—will need to be removed and replaced once the weather warms up. It is part of the original structure and has the original cedar shingles topped by multiple layers of asphalt shingles that should have been removed years ago.

Finally, we are obtaining prices and various options on replacing a rotting (and largely unused) door in the Sacristy area of the church and will soon be getting quotes to repaint the church exterior. This is a top priority for 2013. While we washed the structure last year and did some patchwork painting, one only has to look at the east facing side of the steeple to see the obvious need for this project.

**Thermostats:** We have realized significant savings by using programmable thermostats throughout the church and the MCS building. They are set pretty low during the week and evenings when usage is light. If you are using a room, we want you to be comfortable. So feel free to bump up the heat a bit. There are different brands and the procedure is a bit different for each. But in general, just use the "up" arrow to override the setting and bring the heat up to 70 or 72. Setting it to 78 won't bring the room up to 72 any quicker. After a period of time (depending on the brand) the thermostat will resume its program. There is no need to readjust when you leave. Please DO NOT attempt to reprogram. We found one room reprogrammed to 78 recently, which is a terrible waste of energy.

## Diocesan Convention Summary

As related from the Diocesan Web Site, the 146th Convention of the Diocese convened in Garden City on Saturday, January 12 at the Cathedral of the Incarnation. Originally planned for last November, the Convention was postponed so that the Diocese could focus on serving the needs of our neighbors in the wake of Superstorm Sandy.

The historically two-day Convention agenda was pared down to essential canonical business in order fit into a single day and only voting lay delegates, clergy and essential support personnel were in attendance to fit the smaller capacity of the Cathedral. The Convention will return to the Melville Marriot for a two-day session this Fall.

The Convention considered six canonical changes and one constitutional revision as part of a comprehensive review of our Constitution and Canons. The process of constitutional change requires revisions to be introduced in one Convention and acted upon in the next. The Convention approved five of the six changes to canon, sending one proposal back to committee for further work. The approved changes will permit electronic certification of delegates for future Conventions and redraft our nomination process to focus on discernment, gifts and skills. Changes to canon also removed obsolete provisions governing:

- a.. Archives
- b.. Calling of clergy
- c.. Governance of the Cathedral
- d.. Reporting from diocesan benevolent institutions.

Convention also approved resolutions supporting college ministry and environmental ministry, ratified Diocesan Council's proposal for minimum clergy compensation and passed the financial Ministry Plan for 2013.



Why Healing? It is intended to contribute towards the process of wholeness in the individual to alleviate physical suffering and bring an abatement of pain. To cleanse the soul, to release the emotions. To edify those believers who become aware of the Holy Spirit's healing ministry. To be a sign in an unbelieving world of the kingdom which has come with Christ. To bring glory to God.

There must be faith, a positive expectancy. This may be in the person ministering (John 11:22- the gift of faith), or in the person being ministered to (Mark 5:34; Luke 7:9; Luke 17:19), or in the friends or relatives who bring their afflicted (Mark 2:5). It is also good to encourage some faith response in the person to whom ministry is being given. Sometimes it may be necessary to remove obstacles which may hinder faith (Jesus could do no work in Nazareth because of their unbelief (Mark 6:5,6) and Jesus put out unbelieving mourners from the room of a dead girl and took in just her parents and his disciples (Mark 5:40). We are also encouraged to exercise our faith in prayer for the sick. And we often pray for the sick, visualizing the person whole in our minds eye.
