My Dear Friends in Christ,

On Ash Wednesday, February 14, we are invited to “the observance of a holy Lent, by self-examination and repentance; by prayer, fasting, and self-denial; and by reading and meditating on God’s holy word” (BCP p. 265). Perhaps another way of saying the same thing might be, “What have I gotten myself into, and now, what must I do about it?” That question seems to be one that Jesus’ disciples asked again and again in a variety of ways. It is a fitting question because each year as we approach Lent and Easter we approach them from a new perspective. How have our lives changed in the past year? What changes are needful for me to make now in response to my new perspective and situation? Self-examination and repentance respects the right we all have to change our minds, to turn around and embrace a new course of action, to accept choice as a gift that God has given to every human being.

In recent times, I have found the emphasis of Lent has changed somewhat. Many are saying that Lent is no longer a time for “giving things up.” Rather, Lent is a time to “take something on,” usually a special program or directed study. We need to understand that Lent is the time for both. Indeed, the greatest emphasis in Lent needs to be our time and how we are living it. Most of us are already overwhelmed with the routine tasks of life. How can we even begin to consider taking on “another thing” when we are stressed to the limit? And, unfortunately, giving up chocolate or coffee for Lent won’t really help us if what we are after is a deeper relationship with God. What if we were to “give up” one hour of entertainment or unnecessary computer internet time a day to spend in quietness – just sitting or taking a walk – and let God speak to us? What if each morning before we grab the paper or check the news on our cell phones or laptops, we read just a little bit of the Good News to prepare us for the day? What if we were to look at each activity and ask, “How may I glorify God in this?” There results may surprise you in ways you cannot even begin to imagine.

The point is Lent is not meant to be an unhappy time – spending our time missing the trivial things we have decided to do without for a month and a half. It is a time to say, “God, I need you and ask you to help me reorient my life.” It is a time for silence, for rest, for peace even in the midst of busy lives. Believe it or not, daily routine and peace are not mutually exclusive ways of life. It is a spiritually focused Lent that will help us discover we can have both.

Our Anglican Heritage

Charles Todd Quintard

Rev. Quintard was a physician, Anglican Bishop, founding university president and a civil war confederate army officer. A multi-talented man, he is remembered for rebuilding and opening the University of the South. Raised in Connecticut by his Huguenot family, Quintard received his M.D. from the University Medical College of New York University in 1847. After practicing for a year in Athens, Georgia, he moved to Tennessee where he became a professor at Memphis Medical College and an early pioneer in the field of Yellow Fever epidemiology. Coming under the influence of Bishop James Hervev Otey, he studied for the Episcopal ministry while continuing his medical practice and was ordained a priest on January 6, 1856.

He was to serve as Rector of Nashville's Church of the Advent until after the Civil War, his theological perspectives in line with those of the 'High Churchmen' who favored using as much of the Roman ritual as possible. With the secession of Tennessee, he joined the First Tennessee Infantry Regiment as a chaplain in May 1861. During the conflict he was to serve as both minister, providing religious instruction to General Braxton Bragg, and surgeon, then with the end of hostilities, he resumed his pastorate in Nashville until his consecration as the second Bishop of Tennessee on October 11, 1865. He was to hold that office until his death, greatly expanding the ministry of the Church, especially to newly-freed slaves, and indeed helping to open Hoffman Hall, an Episcopal seminary for blacks which was associated with Nashville's Fisk University.

During the 1850s, Bishop Leonidas Polk had founded, with Bishop Otey's help, the University of the South in Sewanee, Tennessee; Bishop Otey died in 1863, Bishop/General Polk was killed in action at Pine Mountain, Georgia on June 14, 1864, and the Yankees completely destroyed the school. The Right Reverend Quintard set about becoming the "second founder"; he served as the first Vice-Chancellor (the chief operating official) from February 14, 1867 until July 12, 1872 and oversaw construction and the admission of the first students in 1868, while hiring a number of prominent Confederates including General Edmund Kirby Smith to serve on the faculty. During his tenure he travelled extensively in America and England, raising goodly sums of money for the University.

Dr. Quintard received honorary doctorates from Columbia and Cambridge Universities, remained on the job, and died following a period of declining health. During the Civil War he had kept a diary of the experiences of one close to the centers of power in the Army of Tennessee; this was published in 1905, edited by Reverend Arthur Noll, and has remained continuously in print. Today, the University of the South continues in full operation. Bishop Quintard is remembered throughout the Episcopal Church every February 16.

Shrove Tuesday (*widely known as Pancake Day*) is a day in February or March, preceding Ash Wednesday (the first day of Lent), which is celebrated in many countries by consuming pancakes.

Shrove Tuesday, a moveable feast, is determined by Easter. The expression "Shrove Tuesday" comes from the word *shrive*, meaning "confess". Shrove Tuesday is observed by many Christians, who "make a special point of self-examination, of considering what wrongs they need to repent, and what amendments of life or areas of spiritual growth they especially need to ask God's help in dealing with."

Being the last day before the penitential season of Lent, related popular practices, such as indulging in food that one sacrifices for the upcoming forty days, are associated with Shrove Tuesday celebrations, before commencing the fasting and religious obligations associated with Lent.

Do plan to attend of one these special Ash Wednesday services of Holy Communion with Imposition of Ashes: 10:00 a.m., 5:00 p.m. and 7:00 p.m.

May this Ash Wednesday prove the beginning of a rich and rewarding spiritual journey, one that will deepen our faith by opening our lives more fully to God’s forgiving and healing presence.

Lent Madness 2018

The Sainly Smack Down

By now you've heard that Ash Wednesday and Valentine's Day coincide this year. The real Lenten love, however, kicks off the next day on February 15. What do you get when you combine a love of sports with holy saints? Lent Madness, of course. Based loosely on the wildly popular NCAA basketball tournament, Lent Madness pits 32 saints against one another in a single-elimination bracket as they compete for the coveted Golden Halo. But it is more than that: Lent Madness is really an online devotional tool designed to help people learn about saints.

Lent Madness began in 2010 as the brainchild of the Rev. Tim Schenck, an Episcopal priest. In seeking a fun, engaging way for people to learn about the men and women comprising the church's calendar of saints, Schenck came up with this unique Lenten devotion. Combining his love of sports with his passion for the lives of the saints, Lent Madness was born on his blog "Clergy Family Confidential."

They've also inspired thousands of people along the way by forming an online community of people who are passionate about taking their faith but not themselves too seriously. Articles and spots about Lent Madness have appeared in the *Washington Post*, NPR, Huffington Post, FOXNews, NBC, and even *Sports Illustrated*.

Here's how it works: on the weekdays of Lent information is posted about two different saints on www.lentmadness.org and then participants vote to determine who goes on to the next round. Each pairing remains open for a set period of time – usually 24 hours – and people vote for their favorite saint. 16 saints make it to the Round of the Sainly Sixteen; eight advance to the Round of the Elate Eight; four make it to the Faithful Four; two to the Championship; and the winner is awarded the Golden Halo. The first round consists of basic biographical information about each of the 32 saints. Things get a bit more interesting in the subsequent rounds as we offer quotes and quirks, explore legends, and even move into the area of saintly kitsch. It's fun, it's informative, it's the saintly smack down!

This all kicks off on "Ash Thursday," February 15, and will continue throughout the 40-day season of Lent. To participate, log onto www.lentmadness.org, where you can also print out a bracket and fill it out to see how you fare or "compete" against friends and family members. Like that other March tournament, there will be drama and intrigue, upsets and thrashings, last-minute victories and Cinderellas.

This year Lent Madness features an intriguing slate of saints ancient and modern, Biblical and ecclesiastical. 2018 heavyweights include John the Evangelist, Margaret of Scotland, Richard Hooker, Katharina von Bora, and the apostles Peter and Paul. The full bracket is online at the Lent Madness website www.lentmadness.org and, while not necessary to participate, you can order *The Sainly Scorecard: The Definitive Guide to Lent Madness 2018* at www.forwardmovement.org.

This companion guide includes biographies of all 32 saints, a full-color bracket, information about how to fully participate, and a series of Pocket Lent trading cards.

If you're looking for a Lenten discipline that is fun, educational, occasionally goofy, and always joyful, join the Lent Madness journey. Lent needn't be all doom and gloom. After all, what could be more joyful than a season specifically set aside to grow closer to God? As Lent Madness continues to grow and evolve, what won't change is the essence of Lent Madness: allowing people to get to know some amazing people who have come before us in the faith and reminding one another that there's no reason for a dreary Lenten discipline. If this helps people connect with the risen Christ during this season of penitence and renewal, and have a bit of fun in the process, then it continues to be worthwhile.

I hope you'll participate fully this Lent and vote with reckless abandon! (*Once* — this isn't Chicago). Check out the web site: www.lentmadness.org.

What Churches Need to Know About DACA

Most of us are current on the recent political conversations regarding the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals program (DACA).

The decision to rescind DACA will affect approximately 800,000 youth and young adults in America. Those affected by DACA are from varied walks of life. You may be surprised to learn that some of your congregation have been beneficiaries of this program. This decision may affect young adult immigrants in your ministry who may be volunteers, staff members, or a part of the community your church serves. Knowing what this decision means for our nation will better prepare you to help those who are affected in your own community.

DACA was established in 2012 to use deferred action to grant certain benefits to illegal immigrants who entered the U.S. before the age of 16. On a case-by-case basis, individuals would be given a period of deferred action and the ability to request employment authorization. Prior to DACA being enacted, legislation called the “Development, Relief, and Education for Alien Minors (DREAM) Act” was proposed to Congress in 2001. The purpose of the Dream Act was to provide a way for undocumented immigrants who were brought to the United States as children to be granted a way to become legalized immigrants. Though various versions of the act have been proposed several times before the House of Representatives and Congress, it has failed to pass. While the Dream Act has not passed Congress, the need to have policy to manage the growing number of children brought to the United States as undocumented immigrants is still present. Therefore, the DACA program was created. DACA does not provide permanent legal status and must be renewed every two years. A special application must be used to travel abroad for educational, employment, or humanitarian purposes. Traveling abroad for leisure was not permitted. DACA essentially provided grace to certain immigrants who were brought to the United States as children and not on their own volition. Though the program does not provide a path to permanent residency, it does provide the ability to work and live in the United States without fear of immediate deportation.

DACA was rescinded on September 5, 2017 by an official memorandum from the Department of Homeland Security. It will be phased out by no longer accepting new applicants and only renewing applications for those who submitted renewal requests by October 5 and who are eligible for renewal between the dates September 5, 2017 and March 5, 2018, giving the department a 6 month grace period to phase out the program. The decision to rescind DACA was not an overnight process. There were several steps that led to the ending of the DACA program as we know it. In an outcry against expanding the DACA program to include immigrant’s parents of U.S. residents, several states filed complaints in December 2014 with the U.S. District Court for the Southern District of Texas. Over time, the constitutionality of DACA was questioned. Next, Executive Order 13768 was issued by President Trump on January 25, 2017.

The order, “Enhancing Public Safety in the Interior of the United States”, required federal agencies to take measures to ensure the faithful execution of immigration laws, including the removal of aliens. Finally, the memorandum rescinding the DACA program was issued to the Department of Homeland Security when they received a letter from the Attorney General Jeffrey Session urging the Department to end the program, stating that “*an open-ended circumvention of immigration laws was an unconstitutional exercise of authority by the Executive Branch.*”

Approximately 800,000 DACA recipients will be affected by this decision. Those who are currently DACA recipients will retain the benefits until they expire, unless terminated or revoked. However, no applications submitted after September 5, 2017 will be received.

If a renewal request was not filed by September 4, 2017 and one’s DACA privileges have already expired, one cannot apply for renewal. Renewal requests for those who benefits expire between September 5, 2017 and March 5, 2018 will be accepted by October 5, 2017. As of now, there is no plan to proactively report DACA program participants to Immigrations and Customs Enforcement (ICE) for deportation, though this could change.

Here is how the rescinding of DACA will play out over the next few years:

- From August through December 2017, a total of 201,678 individuals are set to have their DACA privileges expire.
- In the calendar year 2018, 275,344 individuals are set to have their DACA/EADs expire.

From January through August 2019, another 321,920 individuals are set to have their DACA/EADs expire.

DACA will most impact churches with immigrant youth and young adults who were brought to the United States by parents or guardians before the age of 16. For some churches, this will not have a great impact. For others, several of your members and their families may be affected. You may even have staff members who were a part of this program.

These historical, present, and future decisions regarding the DACA program will have great implications for our nation, our community and our churches. However, as the body of Christ we are also a part of a greater mission to love one another and to share God’s love and gospel with the world. Through historical changes such as this one, as the body of Christ, we have the opportunity to be a beacon of hope and encouragement to those facing significant life changes. Let us continue to pray for wisdom for leaders and grace for our nation through this season of change.
