Vestry Retreat for 2012

On February 4 members of the Vestry participated in their annual retreat at Little Portion Friary. Three new Vestrypersons, one returning vestryperson, one new Warden, and our Youth Vestry Representative filled out the roster of vestrypersons this year. The day began at 9:30 a.m. with Fr. Richard leading the Vestry in Morning Prayer, followed by a scriptural meditation. It was a busy morning, as members reviewed the mission of Christ's church, Caroline Church's Vision, Mission, Goal and Objective Statements, reflected on the vestry's calling to be leaders, and reviewed how we are to relate to each other as understood in our Vestry Covenant.

The Vestry attended a noonday Holy Eucharist with the Brothers, and shared a meal with the community. After lunch, the vestry did a mutual ministry review with Fr. Richard. We reflected on our desire to have more parishioners involved and committed to the ministry and worship of our parish. We evaluated the fourth year of our Five Year Plan and last year's goals, and set new ones for 2012. Various Vestry Committee assignments were made and counting teams, bible study sign-ups, and Diocesan expectations were reviewed.

These goals were developed for 2012:

1. Engage the inactive and fringe members of our parish into the full life of our faith community. Also, to develop and implement an enfolding process into our parish for new members. There needs to be a greater parish-wide appreciation for volunteerism. The Hospitality Committee, Family Life Ministry (SERF Club) and Churchyard, Grounds and Village Green Committees will take the lead in advancing this goal.
2. Study our Christian Education and Youth Ministry programs with the goal of maximizing their use and effectiveness in nurturing our children and young people. The Christian Education Committee, Director of Church School and Youth Ministry Leaders will coordinate this effort.
3. Develop guidelines for community use of our parish buildings. The Community Service Committee and Rector will advance this goal.
4. Produce a new parish pictorial directory. The Publicity Committee will spearhead this effort.
5. Review Parish By-Laws and update if needed. The Wardens and Rector will oversee this process.
6. Increase parish use of grocery store cards. Finance Committee will focus on this task.

The Vestry believes, with God's blessing and the commitment of all parishioners, that we will move forward on

the goals established for 2012 and our Five Year Plan.

Come to the Forum!

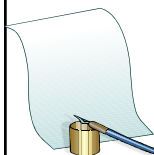

The Vestry Covenant

Recognizing that Holy Scripture will be our authority governing our behavior and relationships with one another and with the larger congregation, and acknowledging St. Paul's directive to Timothy (1 Tim 4:12) concerning his role as church leader to be "an example to the believers in speech, life, love, faith and purity," we therefore agree to the following:

To love one another

1. Creating and nurturing within the Vestry a safe and trusting atmosphere in which all members can feel comfortable and confident in expressing their thoughts and opinions,
2. Being sensitive to the different styles and personalities of individual Vestry members,
3. Seeking to validate, appreciate, acknowledge, and understand the unique and special gifts of each Vestry member,
4. Treating each Vestry member with respect by speaking and acting in such a way as to build up and support one another and confronting issues without demeaning anyone,
5. Refusing to listen to backbiting or gossip about any other Christian, especially other church leaders,
6. Insisting that people who have accusations to be made against another church leader do so in the presence of that individual,
7. Recognizing that certain discussions are of a confidential nature, thus maintain good, wise judgment in respecting that confidentiality,
8. Confronting with love those individuals who have hurt me in any way,
9. Following St. Matthew's principle (Mt. 18:15-17) for conflict resolution between individuals: speaking first to the individual alone; if to no avail, bringing another (Vestry member) and then, if necessary, finally referring the matter to the larger church (entire Vestry),
10. Practicing forgiveness for those I feel have wronged me,
11. Seeking to encourage those Vestry members, who may be suffering through trials of one kind or another,
12. Nurturing a servant attitude in that the Vestry's role is that of serving both God and His church;

To seek God's will by striving for unity in all matters through

1. Joining with the entire Vestry in submitting significant matters to prayer, especially prior to voting or decision-making,
2. Upholding the final decision of the Vestry even when I may disagree,
3. Always seeking to better understand others,
4. Submitting to one another in love,
5. Refraining from all discussions and conversations that are unwholesome and from following a divisive course,
6. Consciously seeking to abandon personal agendas and self-serving attitudes;

To be an example to the congregation by striving to

1. Faithfully attend Sabbath worship,
2. Consistently engage in study of the scriptures,
3. Live out the Christian life through regular, sacrificial giving,
4. Support the church through active attendance and participation,
5. Be faithful to Caroline Church's Vision, Mission, Goals & Objective Statements.

In summary, we will, in the words of St. Paul to the Colossians (Col.3:12-14), "as God's chosen people, holy and dearly loved, seek to clothe ourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, and patience. We will bear with one another and forgive whatever grievances we may have against one another. We will seek to forgive as the Lord forgave us. And over these virtues we will put on love, which binds them all together in perfect unity."

Hunger on Long Island

There are several federal programs to help those who are hungry on Long Island. Last month two were mentioned. Here are a few more you need to be aware of and share with anyone you know who is struggling to put food on their tables.

THE EMERGENCY FOOD ASSISTANCE PROGRAM (TEFAP)

The Emergency Food Assistance Programs provides federal funds and food commodities to states to assist local emergency feeding organizations providing food relief to millions of low-income persons in need of short-term assistance.

Feeding America food banks are the principal non-governmental institutional distributors of TEFAP commodities, distributing an estimated 80% of program benefits through its network of member food banks. Recipients include vulnerable populations of the elderly, children, working families and the homeless. In addition to providing wholesome food to hungry people, TEFAP serves the agricultural community by using surplus commodities purchased by USDA from farmers and other producers.

COMMODITY SUPPLEMENTAL FOOD PROGRAM (CSFP)

The Commodity Supplemental Food Program is intended to improve the health and dietary status of low-income seniors, mothers and young children by providing specialized monthly food packages containing nutrients that may be lacking in their diets.

NATIONAL SCHOOL LUNCH PROGRAM (NSLP)

The National School Lunch Program is the largest of the federal child nutrition programs, reaching more than 101,000 public and private schools and residential child care institutions, and serving over 5.2 billion federally subsidized lunches to more than 31 million children in 2009.

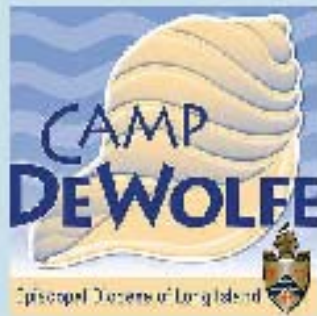
SCHOOL BREAKFAST PROGRAM (SBP)

Originating as one of the Great Society's War on Poverty programs for schools in low income areas, the School Breakfast Program is now a nutrition program that offers federal reimbursements for breakfasts served in all of the nation's public and non-profit private elementary and secondary schools, and public or non-profit private residential child care institutions that choose to participate.

WOMEN, INFANTS, CHILDREN (WIC)

The Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants & Children – known as WIC – is a preventive program providing low-income pregnant women, new mothers, = infants and children with nutritious foods, nutrition education, and improved access to health care in order to prevent nutrition-related health problems in pregnancy, infancy and early childhood. WIC was created in 1974 as a response to the realization that hunger and poverty were widespread in this country and that inadequate nutrition poses real dangers to pregnant women, new mothers, infants and children.
