Our next gathering will be on May 19th at 8:30am. We look forward to having new members.



## Prayer Shawl Gathering Update

On April 7<sup>th</sup>, Holy Saturday, we were blessed to have our fifth annual Prayer Shawl Gathering held this year at The Setauket Presbyterian Church. Twenty women came together to pray, to worship, to knit and crochet, and to meditate on the women at the tomb. We are members of St. James Episcopal Church, Caroline Church of Brookhaven, The Setauket Presbyterian Church, First Presbyterian Church of Smithtown, St. Bridget's RC Church in Westbury, and St. James RC Church in Setauket.

Kate Jones-Calone, the pastoral assistant at The Setauket Presbyterian Church, (and also daughter-in-law of Pat and Len Calone of Caroline) was our guest speaker. She talked to us about the "thin places," a Celtic concept. The Celts knew that God's 'presence' was all around and within them. However, in common with many cultures, the Celts felt that there were 'special' places which seemed more in tune with this 'presence' of God. These 'special places' were 'thin places' where it was felt that the veil between us and God was almost transparent or permeable. These are places or situations where God's 'Presence' could be more readily felt by humans, like a door or a window opening. Even in our everyday life, we can all have favorite places in our homes or in other places, where we feel more relaxed and at peace. These places are truly holy places and are often referred to as 'Holy Ground.' She reminded us that our prayer shawl ministry is a "thin place." The ministry that we do in bringing others closer to the presence of God's love and his healing grace is a "thin place." We shower others with these prayer shawls, and we wrap them in God's love and draw them into that "thin place."

We were reminded that as women we were the first at the tomb of Jesus, and we are told to go out and spread the good news. We are the first apostles! Our ministry is apostolic. We are bringing the good news of God's healing love to those in need or in grief, and that is what we are accomplishing in the shawl ministry. That "thin place" opens the door so that the recipient as well as the giver is closer to God.

We were very blessed to have Donna Koller, from Servant-song Ministries as our speaker at our THM Healing Event, April 20-21. She spoke on Generational Healing - Healing Your Family Tree, a subject that many have not been exposed to, even those involved in healing ministry. Donna says that there are at least 50 references to generational healing in the Bible. From Exodus 20:3-6, "I the Lord your God am a jealous God, punishing children for the iniquity of parents, to the third and fourth generations of those who reject me, but showing steadfast love to the thousandth generation of those who love me and keep my commandments."

We heard about how the sins of our ancestors can affect the lives of our future generations. Addictions, anger, jealousy, miscarriages, divorces, etc. anything that shows a repeated pattern in past generations. These bonds to the past can be broken through prayer and generations can be set free. We placed the names of those we wanted to lift before the Lord on pieces of paper, which were offered in prayer and then burned. It was very powerful and moving to release those held in bondage. We ended with a generational Eucharist, and at the end placed our letters to God at the end to be burned as an offering back to God. Again a very moving service for those involved. If you would like to hear the conference, Donna's talks were recorded and will be available through Bev Tyler for \$10. Donna also spoke at our 3 services on Sunday just giving us a taste of healing in the generations. Donna's message brought healing to us in a very special way through the power and grace of the Holy Spirit. It is God's desire for His children to be healed in body, mind and spirit. ## Buildings Update

Spring has definitely arrived and our grounds are teaming with color. Trees and flowers are in bloom, the grass is green and our landscaper has mulched the gardens. We miss Joan Neuls and her hard work, and continue to pray for her speedy recovery.

Two projects are in the hopper to improve the grounds. First, the diversion of rain runoff from roof tops surrounding Fr. Jim's Garden. This runoff manages to work its way into the basement of the Parish House and Church when we have heavy storms, causing mold, mildew and wet carpeting. That runoff is being rerouted to existing drywells in the Marco Smith parking lot. Disturbance of the grounds and gardens will be minimized and since the growing season is young, recovery will be quick. The Vestry has been hesitant to re-carpet the basement areas and improve the library until this issue is resolved.

Once that project is complete, we will move forward with repairs to the bluestone walkways around the Parish House. A contractor has been hired, but since some of the pipework for the rainwater runoff project will be near or under those walkways, we needed to postpone this repair until the first project is completed. One section of walkway will be redone, with repairs made to areas that have lesser degrees of damage. Both these projects should be completed before Memorial Day weekend.

Indoors, completion of the MCS basement kitchenette renovation is in sight and many of the fluorescent lights in that building have been retrofitted to accommodate the newer "T8" high efficiency bulbs.

One of the main summer projects is some much needed painting. First, the barn needs to be painted and this can be done in house with the help of a few volunteers. Help from young and not as young parishioners is needed. Any high school age students in need of some community service hours? Please give me a call. A small team can accomplish this in a couple of days. The Parish House, slype and church itself need painting. Entryways to the MCS building also need attention. Some of this will need a professional touch. Other parts may be doable in house. Let's get the barn done, then move on from there.

## Vestry Highlights


### March

ECONOMIC JUSTICE FOR ALL? How Inequality is Undermining the American Dream  
Tax Policies And Economic Justice

*“Endow the king with your justice, O God...He will judge your people in righteousness, your afflicted ones with justice. The mountains will bring prosperity to the people.” Psalm 72: 1-4*

“Society has as moral obligation, including government action ... to assure opportunity ... and pursue justice in economic life.” (US Conference of Catholic Bishops)

In June of 1934, at the depths of the Great Depression, President Franklin Roosevelt told Congress that he places “the security of the men, women and children first.” But Yale professors Theodore Marmor and Jerry Mashaw wrote in the New York Times on September 24, 2011: “Fast forward to February 2010” at the depths of the Great Recession’s high unemployment and housing foreclosures. “In 1934” they wrote, “the focus was on family security.... Today, the people have disappeared. The conversation is now on [balancing] the federal budget and not on the real economy in which people live.”

Nobel Prize economist Paul Krugman wrote in his September 23, 2011 New York Times column, as the middle-class stagnated or declined, as the incomes of the wealthiest Americans soared, government “policy has consistently tilted to the advantage of the wealthy, as opposed to the middle class.” While some economists believe such policies stimulate economic growth, Krugman and other economists see little economic stimulus here. Krugman was critical of “the sustained attack on organized labor and financial deregulation [of banks and brokerage companies,] which created huge fortunes” even as they “paved the way for economic disaster.” But Krugman took special aim at these tax policies which he argues are unraveling America’s “social contract:”

Since the 1980s, “the federal tax burden has fallen for all income classes, which runs counter to the rhetoric” that Americans are paying more taxes, thereby justifying cuts in government programs. However, the tax burden “has fallen much more, as a percentage of income, for the wealthy. Partly this reflects big cuts in top income tax rates... [and] tax rates on corporate profits, capital gains and dividends [which] have fallen. While the payroll tax – the main tax paid by most workers – has gone up.” “One fourth of those with incomes of more than \$1 million a year pay income and payroll tax of 12.6% of their income” [compared with a middle-class tax burden of about 36%. ]


