



**Paul Winter's 33rd Annual Winter Solstice Celebration**

Winter solstice is the shortest day and the longest night of the year. Traditionally, it is a time of both foreboding and expectancy, as the longest night leads to the revival of the sun. And yet it is a turning point, when the sun reaches its southernmost point from the equator and seems to pause before reversing course. "Solstice" in Latin means "the sun standing still." In ancient times, observers watched the sun sink lower in the sky each day, and feared it would disappear completely and leave them in darkness.

People practiced special rituals intended to entice the sun's return. Bonfires and candles, with their imitative magic, helped fortify the waning sun and ward off the spirits of darkness. These symbols live on in our modern seasonal customs: the candles of Hanukkah and Christmas are kin to the fiery rites of old, which celebrated the miracle of the earth's renewal.

These traditions reflect our need to come together in times of extended darkness. We celebrate not only the rebirth of the sun, but the community of life on earth.

This year is the 50th anniversary of my first professional band, The Paul Winter Sextet, which emerged in Chicago during my years at Northwestern University, and went on to have some remarkable adventures in the two years of the band's existence. Immersed this summer in our original recordings, I've realized the extent to which the Sextet has been the father of our Consort, and how our Solstice celebrations, over these past three decades, really evolved from the multi-cultural experiences of the Sextet in our grand six-month tour of Latin America in 1962, hearing traditional music in 23 countries.

So I've been excited about the idea of "a meeting of the bands," and having our reunited Sextet be special guests of the Consort during this year's Winter Solstice Celebration. The Sextet will offer a suite of pieces from our original repertoire, and also join with the Consort in new music for the ensembles together. We hope you'll join us for this adventure. *For living music, Paul Winter*



## Buildings & Grounds

The leaves are falling in earnest as I write this on a rainy Friday morning. Soon we will be pulling out mums and planting bulbs that will emerge next spring. Take that walk around the grounds while the grass is still green and there is color left on the trees.

We have grubs. Ugg. A small problem was treated about a month ago, but the issue mushroomed in mid-October. The raccoons were "helpful" by pointing out the problem, but very unhelpful in that they are tearing up the grass to feast on the grubs. Treatments have been applied which will kill the grubs, but damage has been done to the grass by the grubs eating the roots. We are monitoring the problem but certainly some areas of grass will need to be reseeded.

Some recent accomplishments include painting the slype. Thanks to Bob Clancey, Bill Harvey and Mike Massie for the assist. It looks great, but contrasts the church and Parish House, which really need to be done next year. Hinges on the sanctuary cabinets have been replaced to prevent them from opening on their own. Some touch up painting has been done around the MCS Building along with some repairs to the baseboard radiators. As of this writing we have secured the wood needed to replace some facing boards behind gutters on the slype that have rotted out, allowing some water seepage up there. We also now have some secure storage for plumbing, electrical and janitorial supplies in the MCS basement.

On the wish list: tools and a wardrobe closet. If you have tools to donate please let me know. With more work being done "in house," having volunteers bring in the needed tools can be burdensome, especially when that one important tool is forgotten. It also slows things down to have to bring something home to cut, screw or otherwise fix with the shop tool not available on site. Both hand tools and power tools in good working order will be gratefully accepted. This includes such luxuries as a table saw, band saw and drill press. Second, a wood wardrobe closet in good condition (or good enough to refinish) is needed to store the electric piano in the main room of the Parish House. The room looks great with ever-changing displays put up by the Historical Committee, but that metal cabinet just doesn't fit in. We can use it to store tools in the MCS basement if we replace it with a piece of furniture that fits the Parish House décor.

# FARM BILL UPDATE

October 2012

As you may know, both the House Agricultural Committee and the Senate passed different versions of the Farm Bill over the summer, leaving for recess without a final 2012 Farm Bill reauthorized.

**Senate:** On June 21, the Senate passed its version of the Farm Bill that will fund our nation's agricultural and nutrition programs over the next five years. Despite Senator Gillibrand's attempt to maintain and even strengthen our nation's first line of defense against hunger, the final version of the Senate Farm Bill did contain \$4.5 billion in cuts to SNAP (Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program). According to the Congressional Budget Office (CBO), these cuts will result in an estimated 500,000 households a year losing \$90 per month in SNAP benefits. We applaud the Senate for rejecting additional threats in the bill that would have damaged the structure of the program, leaving poorer and hungrier the millions of Americans who rely on SNAP for their basic food needs.

**House Agriculture Committee:** In July 2012 the House Agricultural Committee passed a Farm Bill that cuts SNAP by over \$16 billion. These cuts would be devastating for our most vulnerable neighbors:

- 500,000 households would see their benefits cut by an average \$90 per month;
- 2 to 3 million individuals would lose their food assistance entirely;
- Nearly 300,000 kids would lose free school meals.

## What Next?

The House and Senate will need to reconcile the differences between the two bills before the Farm Bill can move forward. Congress is set to return from recess November 13 at which point more details will become available. But you can act now!

## No Farm Bill?

Although the 2008 Farm Bill expired September 30th most anti-hunger programs authorized in the bill will continue because annual appropriations bills can allow a program to continue even if the underlying authorization has not been extended. The Continuing Resolution (CR) passed by Congress last month to fund the federal government through March 27, 2013 included appropriations that allowed most Farm Bill nutrition programs to continue operating.

## What Can You Do?

As Congress works to write a new Farm Bill and bring our fiscal house in order, we must remind them that cutting programs that put food on the table for hungry Americans is not the right way to balance the budget. Urge Congress to protect and strengthen anti-hunger programs. Make your voice heard today!

Please Protect Hunger Relief Programs in the Farm Bill

Dear [Decision Maker],

As Congress considers how to proceed on the 2012 Farm Bill, I urge you to oppose cutting the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) and other hunger-relief programs. I understand the need to balance the budget, but we must do it in a way that reflects our values as a nation. Asking hungry families to bear the burden of reducing the deficit does not reflect those values.

I support my local food bank, and I know they are struggling to meet the needs of our community. Food donations are drying up, gas and food prices remain high, and nearly 50 million Americans are living in food insecurity. Cuts to SNAP will be devastating. While food banks, churches, and pantries are doing great work in our community, charity alone cannot meet the need for food assistance.

You have an opportunity to make a real difference in the lives of hungry Americans. As Congress considers how to write a new Farm Bill and reduce our national debt, Congress must protect and strengthen hunger-relief programs like the Emergency Food Assistance Program (TEFAP) and the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP). With unemployment still high and many Americans struggling to make ends meet, Congress cannot cut the programs that are helping many of our neighbors put food on the table. Given the associated healthcare, educational, and economic costs of hunger and poor nutrition, cuts to these programs are not only immoral, they are short-sighted and costly in the long run.

As your constituent, I ask that you remember the families who are struggling in our state and remain committed to protecting programs that are a lifeline for hungry Americans. Please pass a strong Farm Bill that that protects and invests in TEFAP and SNAP.


