My Dear Friends in Christ,

September is upon us and we begin a new program year here at Caroline Church. As usual we have many activities, events and educational opportunities in the works for all ages. We have a vibrant church community that is always discerning where Our Lord is calling us to minister. We must continually be vigilant in answering that call. We can expect God to shine forth in our lives in many ways but it is here in this place we call community, Caroline Church in which we know for certain our God is present. It is in the community of the Church that we find the shining-forth (Theophany) of the presence of God.

At least that's what seems to be what is intended. Jesus tells the disciples to take bread and wine and share it in community. The early Church doesn't begin to grow or have a purpose until it began to see itself as a community. St Paul tells us that God gives each of us gifts through the Holy Spirit, but that none of those gifts is worth anything at all if they are not brought to and used by the community of the Church. The Anglican Reformation affirmed that there must be a community present in order for the priest to celebrate Holy Communion. The light of the presence of God shines forth in our lives through the community of the Body of Christ.

You see, by definition, we can't be Christians unless we are part of a worshiping community. There's no such thing as Christianity in isolation. Even the hermits of the desert came back regularly to the community to be fed in the sacrament and to experience the breaking of bread at the community table. We can be good and faithful people, but the word *Christian* means someone who is part of the Body of Christ, the community of the Church. And that means coming together regularly to worship God together and to share in all of the gifts that the Holy Spirit provides through the community of people who gather together in the name of Christ.

We expect a theophany; we expect to find God present in this, God's world. And there are many places where God suddenly presents us with an experience of overwhelming love and support. But when we go out to seek God's presence, we have only one place and that place is in the midst of a people who are bound to each other in love; and we hope and pray that the Church is such a place. We expect a theophany of which we know only the place, and the place is called 'Community.'

I would urge you this fall to encourage others to be an active part of this Caroline community. The greatest gift you can give to a friend is that which makes most sense to you in your own life, and Jesus is the answer. "Bring a Friend to Church" Sunday is on September 28 – a perfect opportunity to invite someone to worship with you and enjoy a special coffee hour.

My prayer is that God will continue to bless us with the gifts that we share: love, friendship, compassion, forgiveness, reconciliation, caring and so much more. We are promised that we may expect those gifts from God; and they will come to us through community.

As we look forward to a new program year, I look forward to all the opportunities to share our lives together, especially in our worship of God.

Equanimity: The Elusive Goal of Spiritual Growth

We seek it in the serenity prayer; we see it in the death of martyrs—equanimity, that elusive goal of spiritual growth. It is the ability to be aware of the struggles of the world, of the birth pangs mentioned in Matthew, of the raging injustices around us—war, lack of privacy, political manipulation, increasing disparity of wealth, loss of community, destruction of the planet—without giving up hope. It is important, however, to realize what equanimity is not. It is neither distraction nor denial, but is instead the ability to remain aware and engaged without despairing. The martyrs who went to their deaths singing hymns did so *because* of their involvement in the world.

Distraction is perhaps the most common method of avoidance. Our culture has developed more avenues of distraction than any society I know-more television stations, more websites, more methods of accessing them. In the constant search for viewership, even news has become a source of entertainment rather than of important albeit often unexciting information necessary for the democratic governance of our society. Fear-inducing and adrenaline-charged reports trump complex political analysis, and as we remain entranced, our power is co-opted. The search for distraction affects not only news, but every facet of our culture. Though one can still find music that seeks to share important ideas, that is not what is promoted to the top of the charts, a process that is itself rigged by record labels to inflate sales. 1 Such distraction allows us to avoid engagement, to ignore our responsibility to our brothers and sisters.

Distraction is not always apparent. For example, our national addiction to competition, whether it is game shows, "Project Runway," or the more than ten cooking competition shows on television today, distracts us from the important questions of how to work together, how to support each other, how to foster thriving. Cooking, the art of preparing an experience for all five senses that brings people fully into the present and in community with one another, is viewed as one more vehicle for individual dominance. Though competition can stimulate creativity, in our worship of the individual, we have lost sight of the goal as the competitive factor becomes the sole focus.

Denial is a close companion to distraction. As we look away from what is significant, we tell ourselves that it is not important, after all. We find excuses for the status quo. We back our arguments with opinions from unqualified people rather than with facts. We seek excuses to dismiss abuses. As a complement to the twins of distraction and denial, chirrupy religions that offer easy answers

have become popular. The prosperity gospel promises whatever we desire for nothing more than the cost of prayer. This is God as the indulgent parent rather than as the of source of righteousness and justice. The long, difficult process of formation has been short-circuited as people seek a fast track to spiritual success.

There is nothing quick or easy about developing equanimity. There is nothing facile about being engaged with the world, yet not angry at the world. It takes prayer, practice, contemplation, study, wisdom, and communal support. It will not be achieved automagically through baptism or confirmation. Those are merely significant steps along a lifelong journey of growth. As we look towards confirmation in October, let us uphold the confirmands in community and pray that they be led towards a lifetime of growth, service, engagement, awareness, and eventually, equanimity.

Our Anglican Heritage The Reverend Alexander Crummell

Episcopalian priest, missionary, and educator, Alexander Crummell was founder of the American Negro Academy in 1897, America's first major black scholarly society. As a religious leader and an intellectual, he advocated for educational opportunities and leadership among young black Americans.

Born in New York City in 1819, the grandson of a West African chief and the son of a free mother, Crummell attended the Quaker-operated New York African School as a young man. Among his classmates were other future black leaders: Henry Highland Garnet, Ira Aldridge, and Samuel Ringgold Ward.

Due to his race, Crummell was denied entrance to General Theological Seminary. Despite this setback, he went on to receive his theological education in the Diocese of Massachusetts. In 1842 he was ordained to the diaconate and two years later to the priesthood by the Bishop of Delaware. In 1844 he established a small mission in Philadelphia where he became involved in politics including the campaign for equal suffrage and the abolition of slavery. After being excluded from the Pennsylvania diocesan convention, Crummell left the diocese and moved to England in 1848 where he graduated from Queen's College, Cambridge in 1853.

As an early advocate of the colonization of Liberia, Crummell went to Africa in 1853 as a missionary and served at four parishes and on the faculty of Liberia College. Crummell believed African Americans needed a moral and spiritual revival and viewed Liberia as the place to accomplish this. Here was an opportunity to create a model Christian republic where blacks could experience a racial uplift with the Episcopal Church providing a moral and rational discipline. Making visits to the United States, he advocated the emigration of blacks to Africa and for African self-help.

After running into opposition and indifference in Liberia, Crummell settled in Washington, D.C. in 1873 and became "missionary at large to the colored people." He focused on founding and strengthening urban black congregations that would provide worship, education, and social services for their communities. In 1883 when the Southern Bishops proposed that all black congregations become separate missionary districts, Crummell organized the Conference of Church Workers Among the Colored People (succeeded by the Union of Black Episcopalians) in protest.

A prolific writer, Crummell published articles, sermons,

and three books: The Future of Africa: Being Addresses, Sermons, etc. Delivered in the Republic of Liberia (1862); The Greatness of Christ and Other Sermons (1882); and Africa and America: Addresses and Discourses (1891). He continued his campaign against racial oppression and the promotion of African American leadership until his death in 1898.

He is remembered throughout the Episcopal Church yearly on September 10.


